During a Pre-Trial motion, Eddie's attorney requested that he be provided with any other fingerprints that were discovered at the crime scene and put into the AFIS computer system to see if there were any matches.

ADA Tom O'Reilly said that there were no other fingerprints found at the crime scene.

During the trial, State Trooper Wayne Riley actually testified that there were 5 identifiable but not yet identified finger and/or palm prints found at the scene.

To this day, those 5 identifiable but not yet identified finger/palm prints have not been submitted into the AFIS computer system.

Why would the DA's office lie about the prints and not have them put into the AFIS computer system?

problem with that, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Good.

MR. O'REILLY: And the last one is to compel fingerprint identification procedures.

THE COURT: Yes.

MR. O'REILLY: Your Honor, the

Commonwealth fingerprint comparison was made by

comparison of the latent prints of Mr. O'Brien. We

have no problem of providing copies, photographs of

the latents, a copy of the fingerprint card to

counsel. Basically, this is requesting that we be

compelled to put this information into the AFIS

computer system. We shouldn't be required to do

this. We have sufficient expert testimony on this,

and Mr. O'Brien, up until the day he was arrested on

this crime, wouldn't have been on AFIS. The

Commonwealth has met every expertise qualification

for fingerprint analysis on this. This is an

additional burden for the Commonwealth on this.

MR. GEORGE: I didn't mean I wanted Mr. O'Reilly to feed Mr. O'Brien's fingerprints into the automated system. He told me in the hallway, and I don't like saying in court what people said to me in the hallway, but I don't think he has a problem with

it, that no other fingerprints were seized at the crime scene.

THE COURT: Is that the case?

MR. O'REILLY: That's correct, Your Honor.

THE COURT: Well, I don't see that we've got an issue here.

MR. GEORGE: Well, it was only an issue if they had seized other fingerprints at the crime scene.

THE COURT: But they don't have any other fingerprints.

MR. O'REILLY: Fine, Your Honor. The Commonwealth has no problem with that.

MR. GEORGE: But I'm not waiving it. It's just that if none were taken then I can't be asking them to feed them into a computer.

THE COURT: All right. Have we taken up everything now that deals with discovery?

MR. O'REILLY: Here, Judge, we still have one discovery material we'll be unable to provide for possibly another four or five weeks is the results of the DNA testing that were initiated last Tuesday, the fifteenth. Those are the materials that we were awaiting.
